FORCE 6 IN SOLENT

A cold, dull windy morning greeted competitors who had travelled to the Hamble to contest the Cougar Marine Southern Speed Trophy on Saturday 26th June.

People sleepily wandered about as scrutineering proceeded, boats were launched and forecasts made as to the conditions further afield in the Solent. We did not have to wait until the race started to experience drama and excitement for right before our very eyes a long red, white and blue Class I hull could be seen being hauled back out of the water.

Aquaglide (Robert Cook & Jo Donohoo), back again since her reappearance three races ago at Poole, decided after initially entering Class I and II to opt for the latter, thus renewing her longstanding battle with Romans Sabre (John Craxford & Chris Kave).

It was not long before the competitors headed off for the start line, and I went in search of a Press Boat. An abortive move indeed, and as the committee and spectator boats disappeared over the horizon, so did the rest of my afternoon's sport as a spectator. Even a radio for updated information was hard to come by.

Determined to find something more than 2lbs of strawberries from the afternoon, this was definitely a case of gleaning information after the race had actually happened. An ecstatic Hewitts team were beaming as they discovered they had won Class I, a first ever offshore victory for the girls in the team. Class II honours and first overall went to Romans Sabre, who had overcome their engine problems experienced at Great Yarmouth, giving them instead to Aquaglide, who returned with only one engine functioning. Gerv and Hagan also had trouble and were forced to retire in B.E.F., the boat being used to qualify for world points.

Another victory for the Rampage team, Spirit of Canada, who seem to be enjoying their winning streak, gave them the spoils in Cruiser Class B.

There was, as usual, a jovial atmosphere later in the day when at the Royal Southern Yacht Club prize giving Tim Powell received a momento for the best performance from someone who was a member of the club. Powell had braved the seas in the HID rig, Wadham Stringer, which nearly caught fire at one stage, and there was a loud cheer as sportsman Tim went up to collect his prize. The Cougar Southern Speed Trophy went to Ian Birnie and Alan Baldwin — about time these lads were up collecting prizes again!
